Railway 200 Exhibition Train

We're sure you've all seen by now that <u>Railway 200</u> has confirmed the route for the first three months of the <u>Exhibition Train</u>. The bicentenary train, named *Inspiration*, will visit 60 locations across Britain over 12 months (including several community rail lines and stations), promoting rail innovation and careers with interactive displays. Active Bystander Training

The <u>Suzy Lamplugh Trust</u> is running a series of 30-minute training sessions on standing up against harassment. The free and participative sessions are designed to empower more people to be active bystanders when they see harassment taking place, without putting their own safety at risk. Other News

New resources

As part of our work with the <u>Foundation for Integrated Transport</u>, we have produced a <u>practical guide</u> to support community organisations in leading on modal integration initiatives. It takes a step-by-step approach to the planning, delivery and review of activities to integrate different forms of public, shared and active transport; to help people access the opportunities they want in a more sustainable way.

The resource itself is best viewed as a 'slide show' due to the inclusion of animations and links within and outside of the document.

We are also pleased to be publishing two new guidance resources for members, both sponsored by Northern. The first is a guide on <u>community rail and tackling anti-social behaviour</u>, particularly at stations, and the second is a guide on <u>community rail and engaging in local planning and development</u>, building on the work of Gloucestershire CRP's '<u>Connecting Communities</u>' guide.

Railway 200

The route for the exhibition train is likely to be formally announced at the end of January: we will update you when we can. Meanwhile, members are invited to the next <u>Education Network meeting</u> on Thursday 20 February, where a representative from Railway 200 will be talking specifically about the Exhibition Train.

- We have recently been awarded a Travelling with Confidence grant from the Motability
 Foundation for a two-year programme of work with four CRPs (CR Lancashire, GO CRP,
 Severnside CRP & South East Communities RP) engaging and empowering disabled people,
 promoting independent mobility and using rail and connecting modes. A dedicated grants
 pot will also be available for other members to access, and resources will be developed to
 help raise awareness of this important topic.
- Community Rail Development Fund (CRDF)

The 2025-26 Community Rail Development Fund is now open.

Accredited community rail partnerships in England and Wales can apply to this funding scheme, which Community Rail Network administers on behalf of the Department for Transport. It is

intended to support projects and activities set out in CRPs' annual plans. The maximum grant for projects in this funding period is £25,000.

You must speak to your usual **contact** within our support and development team to discuss your project before submitting any bid.

- Small Grants Fund (England)
- The 2025-26 Small Grants Fund (England) is open for applications.

Community Rail Network members in England can apply for small grants of up to £2,500 for non-accredited community rail partnerships and community station members, or £1,000 for station friends, adopters and small groups, through this scheme which Community Rail Network administers on behalf of the Department for Transport.

• Transport for Greater Manchester (TfGM) Small Grants Fund

Transport for Greater Manchester (TfGM) is providing funding and wider support to community groups who want to improve Greater Manchester's rail stations. They have made a funding pot available for project bids from community rail partnerships and station friends' groups. CRPs and Community Stations can bid for up to £1,500. Friends Groups can bid for up to £500.

Bids will be assessed on their benefit to local communities. We are looking for evidence-based submissions on what the project is hoping to achieve. This could be, for example:

- Greater local engagement
- Reduced crime
- Improved recycling rates

(Note: projects should not be primarily aimed at increasing rail patronage).

There is no limit on the amount of bids each CRP or Friends Groups can make. All bids must be submitted on the form below and emailed to grants@communityrail.org.uk and will be assessed by TfGM and Community Rail Network, and, where appropriate, Network Rail. Where appropriate submissions will be shared with Network Rail and train operators to a) seek relevant approvals and b) seek additional or match funding. Once a request has been approved funds will be distribute via Community Rail Network.

TfGM are also keen to help applicants with their projects and will also be happy to provide communications support, for example writing press releases or profiling your project on social media.

TfGM's rail officers also keen to help you plan your project and also, where necessary, liaise with Network Rail and the train operators. TfGM may also be able to provide volunteer support. This will be measured as a funding contribution of £15 per hour. Community involvement in rail stations is hugely important and is highly valued by TfGM. It is a key part of their plan to transform rail stations into community hubs that provide access to a range of essential services.

- Our partnership with Scouts on the Platforms for Change scheme continues to grow with 270 Scout groups registered and matched with 130 station adoption groups – a reach to over 4.500 young people! The scheme includes railway safety, station-based activities, rail confidence and a rail experience. Please continue to spread the word about the project to local Scouts organisations and to your station adoption groups and encourage them to visit our page to register their interest. - The new Value & impact of Community Rail report is now published (thank you to the
 members who contributed towards this). This important report about the local difference
 your CRP makes, its reach and outcomes, will provide incredibly useful information when
 talking to partners and completing funding bids.
- We continue to develop our work with our Corporate Partners, the latest being with Team
 BA who provide media and comms services to the rail industry. Their offer to community rail
 is 50 hours of free mentoring and support for Community Rail Network members and

- Several rail industry Corporate Partners can support and help your activities as shown on

- **Bespoke training** for <u>members</u> is also available recent sessions have helped CRPs think about their governance structure, overall aims and visions and their marketing & communications messages. Members can also apply for **Training Bursaries** of up to £200 for

Community Rail Network membership survey for 2024

A big thank you to everyone who participated in Community Rail Network's membership survey for 2024. We received responses from community rail partnerships and station/community groups spanning Britain, and as ever, have carefully analysed the results to help inform our planning for the next year and beyond. (cont.)

The survey provides us with some member satisfaction measures which helps us to assess and reflect on what we are doing well and what we need to improve. In addition, it allows us to create a more detailed picture of your future priorities and challenges, which ensures our work continues to respond to your needs and provides support for the growing community rail movement.

Headline figures for 2024:

- 95% said they received value for money from their membership, compared to 91% last year;
- 89% say we communicate well (very or reasonably) with members, compared to 86% last year;
- 85% received direct support from across the year, compared to 77% last year;
- 80% attended some form of event/training course/webinar, compared to 82% last year
- 78% of CRP respondents got involved in at least one of our campaigns in the past year, compared to 84% last year

Top priorities for members over the coming year

CRPs:

- 1. Developing stronger links with and engaging your community;
- 2. Promoting tourism and leisure travel by rail;
- 3. Promoting rail travel and increased rail usage.

Station/community station/other groups:

- 1. Recruiting volunteers/developing volunteer activity;
- 2. Developing stronger links with and engaging your community;
- 3. Arts/creative/history projects, and promoting rail travel and increased rail usage (joint 3rd)

Most important issues for the new member support strategy to address

CRPs:

- 1. Working to simplify the processes involved in station buildings projects;
- 2. Improving the accreditation process;
- 3. Supporting the development and expansion of integrated sustainable travel programmes.

Station/community station/other groups:

- 1. Improving grants processes, and working to simplify the processes involved in station buildings projects (joint first);
- 2. Supporting the development and expansion of integrated sustainable travel programmes;
- 3. Supporting the development and expansion of education/youth engagement programmes.

Funding and fundraising

- 55% of CRP respondents said they had been affected by cuts to community rail budgets (down from 63% last year), as well as 14% of station/other group respondents (same as last year);
- More than half (56%) of CRPs have made, or are making, plans to explore/access new funding sources, with some having already been successful, currently bidding, or changing governance/structure to help access new funding;
- 53% of CRP respondents said they had been asked by funders to provide information on the social value of their activities (up from 36% last year), alongside 11% of station/other group respondents (same as last year).

The results of the 2024 membership survey will be used to underpin Community Rail Network's planning processes over the coming months and will be crucial in informing our new member support and development strategy. We will also feedback the results to key rail industry and government partners in England, Scotland, and Wales.
