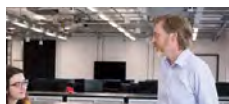

We shared our findings from the Forum in a presentation at last month's Lunch and Learn event, and some of our main takeaways were as follows:

- Agency, hope, and mutual respect emerged as some of the most important factors in making youth engagement feel like a positive experience.
- Young people and members of the wider community can learn a lot from one another, including sharing different perspectives, resources, technical knowledge, lived experience, networking opportunities, and more.
- It can sometimes be difficult to engage with the 18-25 age range – and so LancsCAN Youth will continue to work towards engaging with more young people who are around these ages!

Throughout April our main priority has been building upon the connections we made at the forum and with other local stakeholders to develop some upcoming actions and activities. Green Careers Fair Highlights Opportunities

Fourteen different organisations took part, including a number of LancsCAN members. Together they covered a diverse range of sustainability-related areas such as wildlife conservation, renewable energy, recycling and sustainable fashion.

All students and staff were encouraged to come and find out more from the experts about what they do and what they can offer as career routes as well as volunteering and work placement opportunities for young people.

The event was jointly organised by the college careers team, Futures, and the college's Eco Committee. Students from the Eco Committee and LancsCAN Youth also ran stalls at the event with activities designed to promote environmental awareness and climate action.

Sustainability Lead at the college and LancsCAN Schools and Colleges lead, Jon McLeod said, "We are immensely grateful to all the organisations who attended today. It's a great demonstration of how the shift to a 'greener' economy and society can bring new and exciting opportunities for our young people."

Eco Barnoldswick Repair Cafe

At Barnoldswick Repair Café we are showing how small communities can make a big difference through simple, practical action. Built on the idea of reducing waste and encouraging sustainability, the café brings people together to fix broken items instead of throwing them away. In doing so it helps build a sense of community. We want people to think differently about consumption and move away from a “throwaway” mindset toward a more sustainable way of doing things. Our approach reduces waste and promotes a culture of reuse, which is increasingly important in a world facing growing sustainability challenges. Socially, it creates a welcoming space where people of all ages can meet, chat, and exchange knowledge.

The Repair Café which is kindly hosted by St Andrew’s Methodist Church and funded by donations is a volunteer-driven initiative. Skilled volunteers give their time to help others repair everyday household items such as toasters, lamps, clothing, clocks, and even small pieces of furniture. Sometimes we work with the owners so that they leave with not only repaired items but also with a better understanding of how things work and how they can be maintained.

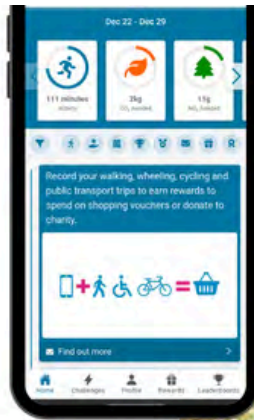
The atmosphere at the café is relaxed and friendly. While waiting for repairs, you can enjoy a chat and a cup of tea as well as a piece of Gill’s delicious cake if you’re lucky.

Whatever you bring, whether it’s a clock for David to look at, a teddy for Joan to fix, a pair of shears for Wesley or a toaster for the electrical team we will have a go at fixing it. We also have a tool exchange where people can bring in tools, they no longer need and exchange them for tools that they might need.

In a time when convenience often leads to unnecessary waste, Barnoldswick Repair Café stands as a reminder that repair, reuse, and community spirit still matter. Its success shows how grassroots initiatives can inspire meaningful change, one repaired item at a time.

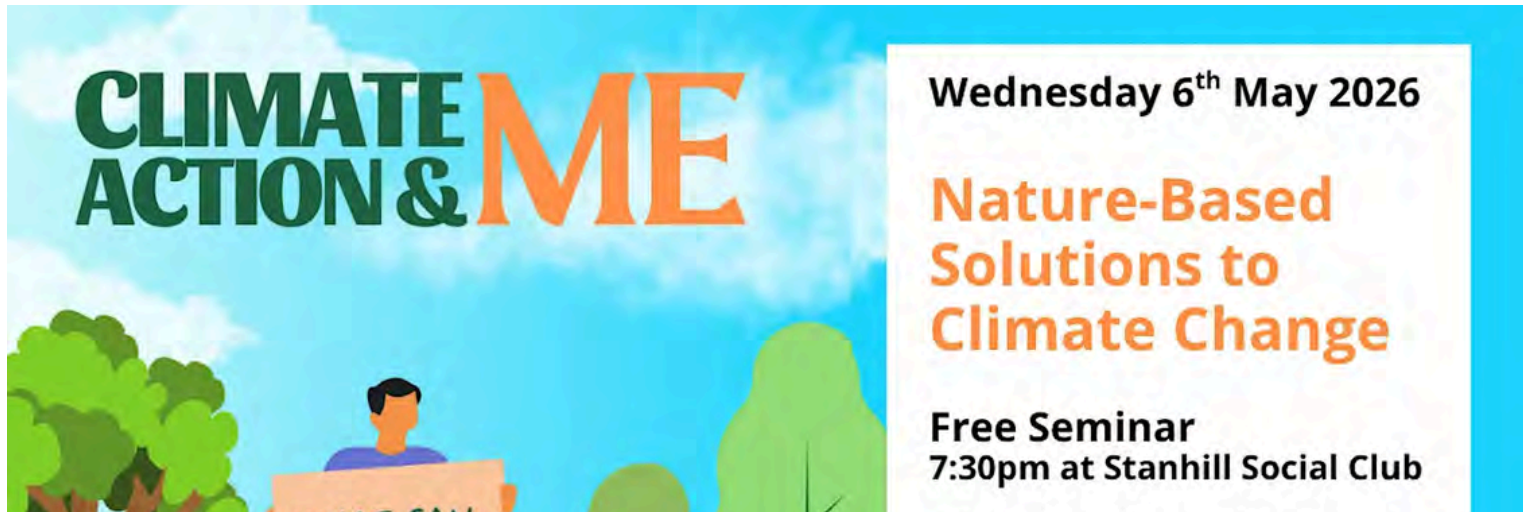

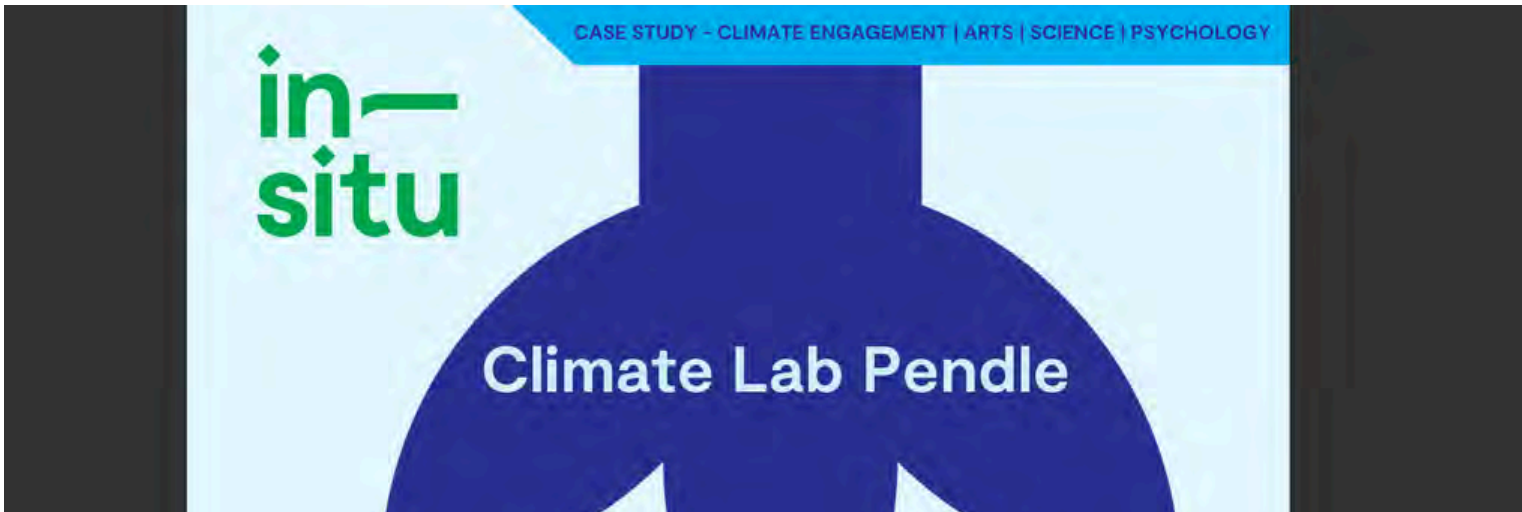

Climate Lab Pendle 2026-2029

We're happy to announce that In-Situ has received funding from Reaching Communities, National Lottery to continue Climate Lab Pendle, a programme we piloted in Nelson with Pendle Borough Council in 2023. We have been awarded £429,000 funding over four years, to deliver the next phase of Climate Lab Pendle.

Climate Lab Pendle will creatively and collaboratively develop local responses to the intersecting crises of climate, inequality and hate through a mass engagement programme promoting knowledge, discernment, listening, respect and collective action.

Local people will form a Community Collective who will work in partnership with In-Situ, Building Bridges Pendle, The People Speak and Catalista to deliver the programme.

It will be the first time we at In-Situ have explored how to extend our internal flat leadership model to incorporate a Community Collective in the leadership of a creative programme, making funds available to cover their time.

Tom Deacon, Catalista, one of our partners, says: "We are living through a time of intersecting crises, playing out at both global and local levels. The entanglement of growing inequality alongside escalating divisions and hate in our societies can feel overwhelming; all exacerbated by the deepening climate crisis. Climate Lab Pendle is a vital opportunity for us to explore healthy and connective ways to face these very real challenges together.

This project sits on the exploratory edge of how to live both healthily and respectfully in this time of deep uncertainty, as well as growing a community cohesion that will empower a clear community voice to steer local decision making."

Climate Lab Pendle 2026-2029

This programme will model alternative ways of approaching climate at a community level. We will challenge mis and dis information and publicly explore new narratives, working collectively from the ground up to navigate these collective and intersecting challenges which include the politics of the Climate Crisis as well as the emotions we feel as we navigate this.

We are designing a project that emphasises the wellbeing and safety of everyone; valuing reflection, seasonal energy, sustainability and healthy working boundaries, and will work in dialogue with Art of Small Talk in Islamabad, Pakistan, to share learning across continental boundaries.

We've kicked off our Spring and Summer season of listening and co-learning events with a refresher and meet-up for our trained Climate Fresk Facilitators. Climate Fresks are workshops exploring the science and politics behind climate change and empowering people to take action. Our facilitators will be delivering fresks across the area between now and July.

We'll have a public launch of Climate Lab Pendle at this year's Festival of Culture in Nelson on 27th June, with artist Dana Olărescu, climate trainer and activist Tom Deacon, Art Collective The People Speak and Creative Collaborator Temujen Gunawardena.

Climate Lab Pendle's programme is working cyclically with the seasons to promote a healthy way of working together that gives space for emergence and values time for co-learning and delivering as well as rest and reflection.

Influencing Decarbonisation in Cumbria: Policy and practice briefings for multi-stakeholder action

This recent project explored four of the most significant barriers to accelerating decarbonisation and identified practical steps that could help unblock them and enable scalable, long-term solutions. Developed collaboratively by the University of Cumbria and Futureproof Cumbria as part of the Zero Carbon Cumbria Partnership, the four briefing papers each focus on a different dimension of the challenge: influencing policy and practice, improving data and evaluation, strengthening civil society action, and securing the funding and resources required for sustained progress. The main project outcome is a set of clear levers for change at local, regional, and national levels, along with recommendations to advance decarbonisation across Cumbria.

Nature Discovery Challenge - how many nature observation records can Lancashire schools make in the summer term?

From counting pollinators to recording grassland plants, help build a picture of wildlife in school grounds and be part of real scientific research – we don't know what's currently living on school grounds, and you will be discovering the answers!

Schools, colleges and nurseries across Lancashire can be part of an exciting project to record the nature on their site. The National Education Nature Park are encouraging all education to observe, monitor and celebrate their local biodiversity, whilst also supporting national community science projects and increasing regional ecological records. The surveys can support young people to develop a connection to nature, increase curiosity, communication and ecology skills, as well as being a tangible (and fun) action for school Climate Action Plans.

There are three biodiversity surveys to choose from - each comes with support resources and ideas on how schools could use the data and observations in other curriculum subject areas:

Tenderfoot Theatre - Ecolab Students Response to LCCAF

LancsCAN member organisation Tenderfoot Theatre are an environmental arts company based in West Lancs, and the company in residence at The Arts Centre, Edge Hill University. Their annual Ecotheatre Lab is an intensive theatre-making course with a focus on sustainable making and climate-based storytelling, in which Tenderfoot support undergraduate students from Edge Hill's Creative Arts department to develop an original piece of dramatic art in response to a shared climate concern. This year, the Ecolab students attended the LCCAF on 4th March and, with support from the Tenderfoot Theatre team, produced a short film in response to the themes and topics discussed at the conference. The piece touches on some of the concerns facing young people today - plastic and litter, AI usage, and our waterways. Featuring original poetry and spoken word by the partaking students, the film encompasses the feeling of worry and concern they began the process with - and the ultimate strength, joy, hope, and community they found during their time at the LCCAF. New Morecambe Offshore Windfarm Community Benefit Fund – Public Consultation

Morecambe Offshore Windfarm Ltd is pleased to announce the launch of the Community Benefit Fund Consultation for the Morecambe Offshore Windfarm. The project is committed to creating lasting, positive outcomes for the communities connected to its development and operation. As part of this commitment, the project proposes to establish a Community Benefit Fund (CBF) designed to ensure that local people share in the long-term advantages of the windfarm.

Located approximately 30km off the Lancashire coast in the Eastern Irish Sea, the Morecambe Offshore Windfarm will contribute clean energy to the UK. Alongside this, through the Community Benefit Fund, the project is committed to supporting initiatives that reflect local priorities, strengthen community assets, and deliver meaningful social, educational, environmental, and economic benefits.

GrantScape, has been appointed to independently lead the full community consultation process. During 2026, GrantScape will gather views from local residents, organisations and key stakeholders to inform how the CBF is structured, prioritised and delivered.

The CBF commitment is as follows:

Substation Community Benefit Fund (Substation CBF) – Up to £530,000 will be made available during the project’s construction phase. The Substation CBF is expected to open for applications in 2027 at the earliest (subject to the project’s construction programme) and will support communities within a defined radius of the onshore substation located near Newton-with-Scales, Kirkham and Freckleton (this is the yellow section in the map below).

New Morecambe Offshore Windfarm Community Benefit Fund – Public Consultation

Annual Community Benefit Fund (Annual CBF) – An annual Community Benefit Fund of up to £200,000 will be available each year of the wind farm’s operation. This fund will support projects across a large area of Fylde and Blackpool, and small parts of Preston and South Ribble (these are the yellow and blue shaded areas in the map below). The Annual CBF area will include communities within the Substation CBF radius. It is expected that the wider fund will open for applications once the project is operational. As set out in the application for development consent, the Morecambe project is expected to be fully operational in 2030 at the earliest.

Please be aware that delivery of the project, and the associated CBF, is still subject to a positive development consent for the Transmission Assets, which is expected in April 2026.

The consultation is now open. The first stage of the consultation is a survey and is open until 22 May 2026.

Who do we want to receive views from?

We are seeking views from a wide range of stakeholders, including:

- Individuals and residents
- Voluntary and community organisations
- Local charities
- Sports clubs and wildlife groups
- Local Authorities
- Parish Councils
- Elected representatives
- Schools, colleges, and other educational establishments

If you are based within the defined CBF area – or if you deliver projects within it – we are especially keen to hear from you.

You are welcome to participate in the consultation even if you are located outside the proposed benefit area. Please note that the CBF boundaries have been carefully defined and these are not anticipated to change significantly.

However, if you believe there is a strong strategic or fundamental reason why the proposed area of benefit should be reconsidered, you will have the opportunity to outline your reasoning as part of the consultation process.

What is involved in the consultation?

The consultation process has three stages:

Online Survey – NOW OPEN

Stage One of the consultation process is **an online public survey**. This is now open until 22 May 2026. Anyone can get involved and answer the survey, although please consider the above carefully and you may also wish to refer to our '**Frequently Asked Questions**' page.

Meetings with Key Stakeholders

Stage Two will involve meetings with key stakeholders such as Local Authorities, Parish and Town Councils, voluntary and community infrastructure organisations, to discuss the findings of the Stage 1 survey. These meetings are expected to be held in July and August 2026.

Public Events

In September and October 2026, we plan to host a number of in-person public events within the CBF areas. These drop-in sessions are open to anyone who would like to learn more about the CBF or discuss potential project ideas.

To ensure wider access, we will also hold two virtual events for those unable to attend in-person.

Full details – including venues, locations, dates, and times for both the in-person and virtual events – will be published on this website in May 2026.

Insights gathered across all three stages of the consultation process will play an important role in shaping and finalising the CBF criteria.

Lunch & Learn: Learning from South Yorkshire as Lancashire's Local Government Changes

Thu 21 May 2026 12:30 PM - 1:30 PM BST Online, Teams

This month's Lunch and Learn theme relates to the upcoming changes to local government in Lancashire.

Local government in Lancashire is set to change significantly through Local Government Reorganisation (LGR). These changes will affect how decisions are made and how climate and sustainability work is supported across the county. For Lancashire Climate Action Network and its members, this is a key moment to understand the new landscape and consider how best to engage with it.

Jess Thomas is Operations Director at the South Yorkshire Sustainability Centre (SYSC), a partnership between South Yorkshire's two universities and the South Yorkshire Mayoral Combined Authority. SYSC has successfully worked within changing regional political structures to connect research, policy and practice and deliver sustainability impact at a regional level.

In this session, Jess will talk about how SYSC has embedded itself within South Yorkshire's governance arrangements, built strong partnerships, and navigated political and structural change. The session will focus on practical lessons that LancsCAN and its members can take from South Yorkshire's experience, and how similar approaches might help support climate action and sustainability in Lancashire as LGR progresses.

This session is designed for LancsCAN members, local authority officers and councillors, researchers, community organisations and anyone interested in how sustainability can be strengthened during periods of local government change.
